Are you ready for Tu Bishvat?

In the need for seder ideas?? We have plenty!!

Need activities? We have lots!!

We have a pamphlet to send you!!

Just get in ask and we will provide!

Here's one of my favorite activities:

Hand out a list of quotes from TaNaCH about trees and Jewish attitudes about trees. (*If you don't have one, we do!*). Go through them and have a brief discussion with the kids. Come up with a summary of the Jewish attitude towards trees.

Then, show the movie or read the book, *The Lorax*, by Dr. Seuss. This main character, the Lorax, is very sensitive to trees and speaks up for them. Have the kids take notes while they are watching/listening to it that show how the Lorax's attitude is similar to Judaism's. Discuss afterwards.

Here's another favorite of mine:

Have a discussion about how animals rely on trees. Make a list on the board. Then, play this version of "Musical Chairs:" Set chairs back to back, ala Musical Chairs, one less than the number of students. Play music, sing a Tu Bishvat song, whistle, etc., and when it stops ALL children must sit down on a chair, even if two are sharing a chair. Then take one away and repeat. Keep doing this until there are few chairs, but all of the kids are on them, sharing. Be sure to stop before the activity gets rowdy! Then, have another discussion about how this game is similar to the situation of animals that rely on tree. Discuss what we humans can do to help the situation (afterall, Judaism is a religion of ACTION)

»Jewish Art Enhances Lifecycle Curriculum

The other day, I uncovered our family baby carriage, polished the chrome, and folded the blankets neatly within. I am going to be a Bubbe! This baby will sleep in the same pram as did her Daddy. She will be wrapped in the same blankets, lovingly crafted by her Great-Grandmother. Honoring our past, brings us love in the present.

I was surrounded by precious memories when I received a copy of Torah Aura's new lifecycle book [The Circle of Jewish Life](#). I opened it directly to the part about baby naming, since that is where my family

currently places itself on the circle. Yet, no matter what stage of life a family is at, this book brings into focus our history, our rituals and the connection we have, to one another, through our life cycle moments.

I am always pleased, and a little perplexed, when I receive requests for learning activities to compliment life cycle curricula. Pleased, because the content area is so very rich, perplexed, for the very same reason. There are, in fact, so many experiences we can offer our students, to honor each stage of the life of a Jewish family.

This year, our school community is fortunate to have many babies, newborn, or expected shortly. When their teacher is pregnant, students rush to me, eager to make the wimple. Traditionally, in pre-Shoah Eastern Europe, fabric from the clothing that swaddled an infant at his brit-milah, was made into a wimple: a Torah binder. The wimple next wrapped the Torah at the child's consecration and at his Bar Mitzvah, and was included in the fabric to make the wedding chuppah. Almost extinguished during the Shoah, the tradition of the wimple has been revived in contemporary Jewish culture. Now, we make wimples for both boys and girls. Sometimes the wimple is still made from the swaddling cloth. More commonly now, the baby is swaddled in the wimple itself.

My favorite way to make a community wimple is to begin...

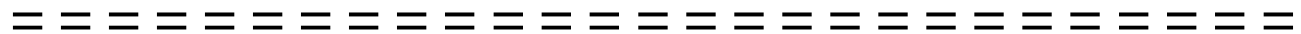


“True, the trees went to a noble cause,” Solomon concluded. “Yet, it’s also true that because of me the forest is gone; therefore, it is upon me to bring it back.”

-from *Solomon and the Trees* by Matt Biers-Ariel, UAHC Press, 2001

Questions for discussion:

1. Think about a time when you planted a tree, helped clear away debris from a play area, created a bird sanctuary, or had a similar experience, and tell your colleagues about it. Describe your feelings upon approaching the task and upon finishing the job.
2. In recent years, and in recent months, areas of our country, including Southern California, have suffered great fires, which have affected trees and other wildlife. Yet a strange thing often happens after a fire. Trees begin to regenerate. In Southern California, some kinds of chaparral (a general term that applies to various types of brushland) have leaves that are coated with flammable resins, seeds that require intense heat for germination, and roots that are specially adapted to enable the plant to grow in areas that were recently burned. Furthermore, when the chaparral is burned many of the nutrients that have been locked up in it are released and recycled back into the soil. The Douglas fir, found in areas of the northwest, regenerates readily on sites that have been prepared by fire. In fact, nearly all the natural Douglas fir stands in the United States grew on ground that had burned. Common trees and shrubs often are able to sprout from surviving plant parts after a fire. This is a very hopeful response to tragedy. What lessons can we learn from the trees?
3. Rabbi Elazar ben Azaria, a Talmudic sage of the first century CE, said: “Any time our wisdom exceeds our good deeds, to what are we likened? To a tree whose branches are numerous but whose roots are few; then the wind comes and uproots it and turns it upside down. ...But when our good deeds exceed our wisdom, to what are we likened? To a tree whose branches are few but whose roots are numerous; even if all the winds of the world were to come and blow against it, they could not budge it from its place...” What are some actions young children can take to make positive changes in their world? How can young children become part of the regeneration process? In *Solomon and the Trees*, the forest is cut down to build the Temple in Jerusalem. Solomon makes sure that he is not only part of the problem but also part of the solution by planting new trees to regenerate the forest. Where are areas of your community that could benefit by becoming greener? How can your children be part of this process?
